The Leader of the Council, Councillor Adrian Edwards introduced this item. He explained that the Newbury 1 Event Committee assisted by the English Civil War Society (ECWS) are organising a re-enactment of the 1st Battle of Newbury on 23-24 June 2018. This event is to mark the 375th anniversary of this battle and will be held on the original battlefield adjacent to Cope Hall Lane, Wash Common.

Councillor Edwards asked if this Council would support this event, which will attract a huge number of participants and audience, by way of distribution of posters & flyers and through its social media pages. He also asked for volunteers to help steward the event which cannot take place without enough voluntary support.

Minutes of Meeting held on 20 February 2018

The minutes of the meeting held on 9 January 2018 were agreed as an accurate record.

Items for discussion: -

Jack of Newbury Statue – Cllr Margo Payne reported that the full-size cardboard cut-out of the statue was made by the artist and displayed for all relevant parties to view the statue in location to show how the statue actually enhances the entrance to Park Way Shopping rather than blocking it.

There is to be a reception in the Town Hall for invited guests to receive a talk from Dr David Peacock and the sculptor will be available to speak and answer questions.

Binary Conversation – In his absences, Cllr Dave Goff provided a picture of the plaque that has been placed with this statue.

Regarding the lighting of the statue, Cllrs Howard Bairstow and Martha Vickers expressed their wish that solar lighting be strongly considered for this project. Joyce was actioned to speak to the Services Manager regarding this possibility. The cost of this project still needs addressing, however it was suggested that a solar lighting company may reduce the cost if they are allowed some advertising at the statue.

Arts Trail Guide – Cllr Margo Payne Margo and Joyce walked a 30 minute route suggested for the Town Trail short walk enabling coach visitors who have an hour stop-over to see something of what Newbury has to offer and still have time for a cup of tea and something to eat. The route was agreed with the suggestion that the Newbury Mosaic be mentioned on the map as well as the Stone Building which is thought to be one of the oldest buildings in Newbury.

Cllr Margo Payne will work on the detail of the map and following the Annual Town Meeting, Corporate Services to be approached to finalise and print the leaflet.

Ebb & Flow Information Panel – As Cllr Margo Payne has been working on the Arts Trail Guide, the Ebb & Flow Information Panel has been put on the back-burner for now. Once the Art Trail Guide is completed, she will return to re-writing the Ebb & Flow Information Panel.

John Gould MBE – Cllr Martha Vickers suggested that the location of this piece of art is not prominent and that residents visiting the Library have difficulty finding it. As the bust is the property of the Newbury Society, Mr Bernard Eggleton was asked to take this suggestion back to the Newbury Society for their action, which he happily agreed to do.

Possible Future Projects

Finger Posts – Mr Bernard Eggleton stated that the finger posts are often confusing and not positioned to the best advantage. As these posts belong to West Berkshire Council, it was felt that this was something beyond this Steering Group and perhaps the Newbury Society should raise the issue with WBC.

Street Maps of Newbury – Cllr Howard Bairstow pointed out that this very useful guide to our town does not exist anymore and would be a useful addition to our Reception Area information.

Couple in Conversation – Following the recent publicity regarding the ‘Angel of the North’ 20th anniversary featured on television news, Mr Bernard Eggleton suggested that we research the date that Couple in Conversation was officially unveiled, then perhaps we could raise the profile of art in our community through publicizing our entry into town.

Queen Victoria Statue – Mr Bernard Eggleton suggested that an information panel could be erected for this statue, including how it was sponsored by an leading resident of the town and the detail of the individual features of the statue and where they are situated now. Cllr Howard Bairstow agreed to speak to Mr Michael Lewis, a local resident who is a relative of the late George Sanger who commissioned the statue.

Date of the Next Meeting: - The next meeting will take place on Tuesday, 27 March 2018 commencing at 6.15 pm in the Town Hall, Newbury.

Quorum: Two Councillors and one other

Goals:

1. To make the town a more exciting and attractive place to be for both local people and visitors
2. To develop new audiences and encourage participation in visual and possibly performance arts
3. To raise the awareness of Newbury's heritage by selecting sites which are of significance to the history of the town
4. To develop an appreciation of art by schoolchildren and local residents through the provision of "artist workshops" as part of any major project undertaken.

Deliverables

Introduction of a series of permanent and temporary works of art into the town.
The production and maintenance of a guide / leaflet (available on-line and in print).

Scope / Jurisdiction

The Town Trail Steering Group, which has been renamed the Newbury Art Trail Steering Group, was formed by Newbury Town Council in 1998 as a working group of the Civic Pride committee with the purpose of introducing a series of permanent and temporary works of art into the town centre. Membership is drawn from the Town Council and from other organisations and individuals as appropriate to the projects at hand. Care is taken to represent all stakeholders and cover a wide range of expertise. Members include representatives of the local arts & cultural community, local commercial organisations, artists, local interest groups and local authorities.

The steering group reports into the Civic Pride, Arts & Leisure Committee of the Town Council.

Guidance from the Council / Parent Committee

Given the complexities and need for flexibility when it comes to public art commissions, the NATSG will operate autonomously most of the time. However, as the NATSG will act in the name of the NTC it will:

- Inform the Civic Pride, Arts & Leisure Committee or other relevant committees of all major financial or artistic developments
- Keep the committees informed about progress on current and anticipated projects.
- Seek the approval of the relevant committee should any funds be required in the

course of a project.

- Provide the Civic Pride, Arts & Leisure Committee or other relevant committees with information relating to costs for manufacturing, installation and on-going care & maintenance for any new artwork to be commissioned.

Resources and Budget

The group will meet in the Town Hall. Administration support will be provided by the Civic Manager. There is currently no budget available from the Town Council.

Governance

The Working Group will discuss proposals proposed by members and decide through consensus, majority vote, (with chair's casting vote if necessary), what should be taken forward for action or for consideration by the Arts and Leisure Committee.

Additional Notes

- The working group aims to meet at least quarterly and with agenda, minutes and administration support.
- The working group will aim to communicate through email, phone and site meetings, both formally and informally.
- The chair will provide regular updates to the Civic Pride, Arts & Leisure Committee.
- Information, reports and documents to be stored in a sub-folder under the Civic Pride, Arts & Leisure folder on the Town Council IT data store, plus an e-mail store within the Civic Managers e-mail folders with copies distributed to members

These Terms of Reference may be reviewed and changed as necessary by the Working Group in the light of additional information, with any significant changes being brought back to the parent committee (CP,A&L) for ratification.
